Parking and Safe Driving

NAPLAN

This week our staff have received our 2019 NAPLAN results. We are delighted to see a positive improvements in our trend data in Grade 3 and Grade 5 in all areas. Staff will continue to analyze this data in the coming weeks to inform our whole school teaching and learning programs. Grade 3 and Grade 5 students will be bringing home their NAPLAN results on Friday this week. If parents have any questions regarding their child's results, please make a time to talk with your child's teacher. Please keep in mind that NAPLAN is a snapshot in time of your child's learning in May.

Student Attendance

We, along with the Department of Education, have been collecting attendance data and are becoming increasingly concerned with the frequency and number of student absences or late arrivals to school. We understand at this time of year there can be higher levels of ill-ness but there are also many students taking extended family holidays during the term or having unexplained absences. Attending school every day obviously results in the best outcomes for students as they don't miss out on important learning. Classroom teachers or administration staff will be contacting families to discuss concerns we have with any student's attendance and we will work with you to identify ways to improve this. Our focus is to ensure the very best outcome for your child and missing a day a fortnight or more can mean that over their primary school life they have missed six to twelve months of schooling.


